John F. "Gus" Homer, Jr., 78, of 19 Chapel St., Newport, passed away on Friday, October 5, 2007 at the Newport Hospital. Born in Newport on February 12, 1929, he was a son of the late John F. and Edith E. (Myers) Homer.

He was a graduate of Salve Regina University, receiving a BA in Special Education-Psychology. Gus served in the U.S. Air Force and was a veteran of World War II, the Korean War, and Vietnam. After retiring from the Air Force in 1967, he

He returned to the states in 1984 and was employed by Kamon Aerospace Corp., Mosseup, CT, until his retirement in 1990. He returned to Newport and resided at Donovan Manor.

He was a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, Dennis E. Collins, Division 1 Newport, and a member of the American Legion, Post #1, Paris, France. Gus is survived by his three sons, John F. Homer, III of North Kingstown, Edward K. Homer of Middletown, and Michael J. Homer of Newport; two daughters, Theresa Gizdavitch of Seaside, OR, and Christine Dunn of Soux Falls, SD; 8 grandchildren, Edward K. Jr, Katie, Joseph, Brittany, Ava, Jon, Avery, and Grace; three brothers, George X. Homer of Harrisburg, PA., Robert A.. Homer and James N. Homer, both of Newport; three sisters, Dianne E.
