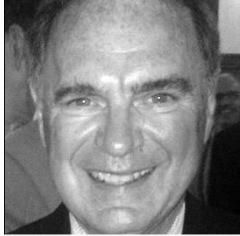


## Arthur G. Leonard



Arthur G. Leonard, 74, of Middletown, and formerly a long-time resident of Cumberland, passed away Christmas Day, Friday, December 25, 2015 following complications from heart surgery at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. He was surrounded by family.
